The Season of Advent

In the First Reading from the Prophet Isaiah, the prophet is describing the joy that will come over the people of Israel who have been patient and didn't give up hope while waiting for deliverance from captivity in Babylon. In the same way the faithful, who are waiting for deliverance from this life on earth in order to enter heaven, "we shall enter singing, crowned with everlasting joy."

In the Responsorial Psalm, the psalmist extols the goodness and generosity of God who, in His own good time, provides all the necessities of humankind. However, it is often difficult for us to see this in the midst of life's struggles. Therefore, we must constantly call upon God in prayer to renew our faith and grant us the virtues of hope and patience.

In the Second Reading from the Letter of St. James we hear the apostle encourage his flock by advising them to be patient. This letter was written during a period of severe persecution when all seemed doomed; but James suggests that the people look to the prophets of old who were despised by their own people, yet never gave up hope. Or consider Job, who lost everything; yet because of his faith and hope in God, he regained everything and more.

In the Gospel Reading from the Gospel of Matthew we hear the familiar story of John the Baptist, the last of the Old Testament prophets, who was in prison at this time. He must have been very discouraged knowing that his end was near. He sends friends to Jesus to learn if He, Jesus, is the "One who is to come?" This is another phrase meaning "Messiah." Jesus, rather than answering with a subjective or abstract "Yes," points out the things that He has accomplished--- the blind recover their sight, cripples walk, deaf hear, etc. This must have encouraged John the Baptist because it was for just this very reason that he had worked so hard at preaching a baptism of repentance. Now he can rest in peace. But listen to the last sentence. It should cause one to sit up and take notice. Jesus says "...the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he" (John the Baptist). How can that be?

Feast Days This Week

Monday

St Paul of Latros - Byzantine hermit, sometimes listed as "the Younger." Paul was born at Pergamos, near Smyrna, in Asia Minor, the son of an officer in the Byzantine army. His father was killed in battle, and after his mother died, he became a monk in a community on Mt. Olympus in Greece, with his brother, Basil. Paul later left the monastery and became a hermit on Mount Latros in Bithynia, Asia Minor. Soon he attracted followers, and Paul was compelled to organize them into a laura, or community. After twelve years, Paul departed Mount Latros and settled on the island of Samos to live in a cave. More followers gathered around him and Paul oversaw the creation of several more lauras before returning to Latros, where he died after years of prayer and mortifications.

Tuesday

St Ado of Vienne - Ado was born in Sens in France and educated at the Benedictine abbey of Ferrieres. Abbot Lupus Servatus, an outstanding humanist of the time, trained Ado and was impressed by his obvious holiness. A noble by birth, Ado renounced his inheritance and became a Benedictine. Ado's holiness made him enemies, and he went to Rome on pilgrimage and remained there for two years. He served as pastor in Lyons until the year 860, when Pope Nicholas I appointed him Archbishop of Vienna. He reformed the clergy and opposed the actions of King Lothair II who tried to set aside his lawful wife to marry his mistress. He remained in Vienne until his death in 875.

Wednesday

St Olympias - She was born into a wealthy noble Constantinople family. She was orphaned when a child and was given over to the care of Theodosia by her uncle, the prefect Procopius. She married Nebridius, also a prefect, but was widowed soon after. She entered the consecrated life and with several other ladies founded a community. She was so lavish in her almsgiving that her good friend St. John Chrysostom remonstrated with her and when he became Patriarch of Constantinople in 398, he took her under his direction. She established a hospital and an orphanage, gave shelter to the expelled monks of Nitria, and was a firm supporter of Chrysostom when he was expelled in 404 from Constantinople and refused to accept the usurper Arsacius as Patriarch.

Thursday

St Rufus - Rufus and Zosimus were citizens of Antioch who were brought to Rome with St Ignatius of Antioch during the reign of the Emperor Trajan. They were condemned to death for their Christianity and thrown to the wild beasts of the arena two days before the martyrdom of Ignatius.
